

This year marks the 200th anniversary of the Restoration Movement.

In an effort to bring about the vision and dreams of the early Stone-Campbell Movement, this past Sunday, May 15, Restoration 200, celebrating our denomination's 200 years was held in Lexington, Kentucky.

Our church and denomination has roots in the Stone-Campbell Movement of the early 19th century.

We were born on the American frontier as our great nation expanded westward. Our church and denomination falls under the Restorationist family of the mainline Protestant tradition, as opposed to the evangelical Protestant tradition, which tends to be more theologically and socially conservative.

As DOCs we emphasize baptism by immersion, the centrality of communion and "wholeness in a fragmented world."

We still seek to live out the Restoration movement.

Like those of the past, we still seek to be free from denominational creeds and traditions, favoring a "Bible only" approach that we hope unifies believers.

In 1816, a group of Christians who ascribed to that philosophy is said to have begun meeting in Lexington.

But, prior to that Barton W. Stone led the Revival of August 1801 at Cane Ridge meeting house in Bourbon County in 1801.

First hand descriptions abound of individuals, taken by great emotion, falling to the ground, crying aloud in prayer and song, and rising to exhort and assist others in their responses to the moment.

It was the climactic event of the Western Great Revival.

Soon after Barton Stone left the Presbyterian Church and established an independent church.

Stone's movement eventually joined with another led by another former Presbyterian, Alexander Campbell, after Stone met Campbell in 1824 while Campbell toured Kentucky to preach at churches in Lexington and other parts of central Kentucky.

After that, the Restoration Movement became known as the Stone-Campbell Movement.

The goal of the movement was to mimic the church described in the New Testament, and its members united under the names

"Christian" and "Disciples of Christ."

Believers were known for taking communion each week and a belief in adult baptism by immersion, which we still do today.

Some Churches of Christ do allow pianos in the church sanctuary.

The sadness of our movement that "a movement that wanted to bring Christian unity" is now in three pieces.

Sadly, we who wanted to restore the church to the New Testament image has splintered over a variety of issues through the years, ranging from missions to the use of musical instruments.

Restoration 200 is an effort to bridge the gaps that have divided us over the years.

As Jesus prays in John 17:21 "I pray that all of these people continue to have unity in the way that you, Father, are in me and I am in you. I pray that they may be united with us so that the world will believe that you have sent me."

Our church is uniquely poised to reach out those people in our community seeking a place of hope in their lives.

As the apostle Peter challenges us, "always be ready to give an answer to everyone who asks you a reason concerning the hope that is in you, with humility and fear."

May it be so.
